In my case, as chair-dragon of the Mothers Infants and Newborn Dragons group (M.I.N.D.), and full-time dragonlet-minder, I shall concentrate upon aspects of practical parenting.

Without doubt, the most common enquiry I receive is from distraught female career-dragons who want to continue going out to work after their dragonlets hatch, yet

feel, in some way, they are depriving their offspring of motherly love if they do so.

Firstly, let me say that there really is no substitute for a mother's love. However, the solution is one of quality rather than quantity. Anyone with more than a pinch of common sense would prefer a small but perfectly baked cake to a much bigger but badly baked one. So it is with youngsters. Even though you may spend less time than you would like in your own cavern, make sure whatever time you do have together is full of interest, of tranquility and love. Sweeping the cavern floor can wait until after you've given junior a cuddle. And get father involved. If he's too hungry to wait for his meal then he's got two choices: either he learns to cook, or forgets his paperwork and plays Snords and Dragons (and make certain he's the Snord!) and leaves you free to prepare dinner. No matter how hard a day you've had, not a cross word should be spoken until after the babes are asleep—by which time you'll probably be too tired to argue anyway.

Added to this, there are certain advantages. It is inevitable that a dragon-couple will, at some time, wish to go out together of an evening (perhaps to hold paws, watch the sunset and share a charcoal cookie) and will seek to enlist the services of a dragonlet-sitter. A dragonlet

who is already used to mother going off (and who knows that she'll be coming back) is far less likely to have to be prized off her tail, kicking and screaming, the moment she takes a step beyond the cavern entrance. Good dragonlet-sitters are in great demand and, you can be sure, they will be 'permanently booked' if your pride and joy gains a reputation for being uncommonly difficult. Rest assured, there really is nothing simpler. Either rake a good depth of hot ash over the eggs, or turn them regularly in order that they become uniformly warmed. Answer: Grackene is made both ways; you can purchase her with legs or without. The factory

had a terrible time getting her legs to come out of the mold without them breaking

so sometimes they lower her skirt to cover those beautiful limbs.

Question: Didn't #1301 medium Wodema, #1302 large Wodema, and #1703 small Rueggan

have two crystals when they were first introduced?

Answer: Yes. All three pieces had two crystals when they were first made. Wodema traded

one crystal for a beautiful large apple, which we think she ate. Rueggan donated his crystal to the wizards and has found an interesting book about ancient machines.

Question: Where can I find retired or re-designed figurines?


